

External Peer Review for

The Strategic Evaluation of Austrian Development Cooperation's Engagement in Palestine

Terms of Reference (ToR)

1. Background

The Austrian Development Agency (ADA) was founded in 2004 as the operational unit of Austrian Development Cooperation. The Federal Ministry for Europe, Integration and Foreign Affairs (MFA) is responsible for the strategic planning and alignment of Austrian Development Cooperation (ADC). ADA's three major goals are combating poverty, ensuring peace, and preserving the environment. ADA currently funds around 600 projects and programmes which are implemented through partner organizations in ADA's key regions and priority countries. Its strategy is described in the "Three-Year Programme on Austrian Development Policy 2019-2021"¹ outlining principles as well as operational priorities.

Peer Review is an internationally established tool in development cooperation to ensure quality and enhance learning. Other bilateral development cooperation actors integrate elements of peer review into their strategic and programmatic evaluations.²

ADA's evaluation unit, together with MFA's evaluation unit, is responsible for commissioning and managing strategic evaluations. The Austrian Development Cooperation (ADC) introduced the instrument of Peer Review (PR) in 2018 as a tool to enhance the methodical, methodologic or subject level quality of its strategic evaluations. It is meant to supplement the quality assurance process through ADA and FMA evaluation units and the Evaluation Reference Groups. The Evaluation Policy of the Austrian Development Cooperation, which has been developed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (BMEIA, VII.4) jointly with the Austrian Development Agency (ADA) and in cooperation with other key Austrian ADC stakeholders, makes reference and encourages the use of peer reviews as a useful tool to enhance quality and learning³.

These Terms of Reference (ToR) are developed for the methodologic peer review of the Strategic Evaluation of ADC's Engagement in Palestine.

The assignment for the methodological peer review is for one peer reviewer for 14 working days and will be spread over the period end November 2021 to June 2023. This assignment is desk-based, with one visit to Vienna during the assignment.

2. Purpose

The peer review aims at:

- Supporting evaluation management in developing a suitable evaluation and technical approach at the outset of the evaluation
- Contributing to the quality assurance of the strategic evaluation
- Supporting the application of rigorous evaluation methods which are up to date

3. Responsibilities

ADA's evaluation unit is responsible for steering the evaluation process and the communication between evaluation team and peer reviewer. The evaluation unit will ensure that adequate time is given to the reviewer to submit her/his written input. The peer reviewer will be provided with an evaluation plan and approximate timelines for their feedback at the outset. Delays or changes will be communicated to the reviewers timely. Equally, the peer reviewer is asked to communicate his unavailability for a certain time period in a timely manner to the ADA Evaluation unit.

4. Deliverables

The Peer Reviewer contributes to the quality of strategic evaluations by commenting in writing on the draft ToR, the selected proposal, the draft inception report and suggested methodological approaches, the reconstruction of the Theory of Change, guidelines for interviews, focus group discussions and workshops as well as the preliminary findings and the draft evaluation report. Furthermore she/he will participate in five meetings (kick-off, presentation draft inception report, Theory of Change workshop, presentation preliminary findings, as well as findings and recommendations workshop) as well as ad-hoc virtual meetings related to her/his written feedback provided. One of the meetings might take place in Vienna, all others will be conducted virtually. Finally, she/he will provide a written input to ADC's After-Action Review exercise in which the lessons learned from the evaluations process will be shared. All deliverables will be submitted in English unless otherwise agreed in advance with ADA's Evaluation Unit.

5. Payment

Payment will be based upon deliverables and be made in three instalments, as follows:

- First instalment of 30% of the maximum payable amount upon submission of comments on the draft TOR;
- Second instalment of 30% of the maximum payable amount upon submission of comments on the selected proposal, the Theory of Change (ToC) and the draft inception report;

- Third and final instalment (40% of the maximum payable amount) upon submission of the comments to the preliminary findings, the draft evaluation report and submission of the After-Action Review comments as outlined above.

6. Qualifications of the peer reviewer

The peer reviewer should be an acknowledged expert in the field of evaluations and should have the following qualifications:

- In-depth knowledge and professional experience in evaluation methods and methodologies, proven by at least two publication (can be also working papers, etc.)
- Proven experience in peer reviewing evaluations in the area of development cooperation;
- In-depth knowledge and experience on Theories of Change in the context of development cooperation;
- Experience in designing and applying evaluation methodologies in fragile contexts and politically sensitive environments is an advantage;
- Familiarity with strategic evaluations in the context of Austrian Development Cooperation is an advantage;
- Fluency in both oral and written communication in English is a requirement;
- Strong analytical skills;
- Excellent writing and communication skills.

7. Working days

The cooperation will be agreed on during the whole period of the evaluation, starting with the ToR and ending with the evaluation report. The following table describe the maximum working days for the peer review.
